Dear Chair Crapo, Ranking Member Wyden, Chair Smith, Ranking Member Neal, Chair Guthrie, and Ranking Member Pallone:

On behalf of the patients, providers, families, and health professionals our 101 organizations represent, we urge you to advance the Alternatives to Prevent Addiction in the Nation (Alternatives to PAIN) Act (H.R. 1227/S. 475) as soon as practically possible. This critical legislation is needed to prevent unnecessary exposure to opioids and ensure access to the wide array of FDA-approved, safe, and effective non-opioid pain management approaches for older adults in America.

Congress has already taken an important step to expand access to non-opioid treatments through the Non-Opioids Prevent Addiction in the Nation (NOPAIN) Act, which took effect January 1, 2025. This law expands Medicare Part B coverage of non-opioid pain management for outpatient surgical procedures. However, millions of older adults receive care through Medicare Part D, where access to non-opioid therapies remains limited. As a result, these beneficiaries are drawn toward lowest cost pain management options, which are often generic prescription opioids.

Our country's older adults are not immune to the worsening opioid epidemic, with overdose deaths among people 65 years and older soaring by more than 60 percent in the last decade.<sup>i</sup> In 2022, more than 1 million older adults were diagnosed with an opioid use disorder,<sup>ii</sup> and more than 50,000 suffered an opioid overdose from prescription opioids, illicit opioids, or both.<sup>iii</sup> In fact, despite a 40 percent nationwide decrease in opioid prescribing over the last decade, including some voluntary and successful initiatives among certain providers, opioid prescribing in Medicare persists.<sup>iv</sup>

Congress must remain vigilant in fighting this crisis. Older Americans deserve choices when managing their pain or recovering from surgery.

The Alternatives to PAIN Act provides a timely and commonsense solution to one of the most pressing public health challenges of our time. By aligning cost-sharing for non-opioid pain management in Medicare Part D with that of generic opioids, and removing unnecessary utilization barriers, this bill would ensure patients and providers have real and affordable choices in treating post-surgical acute pain.

We are hopeful Congress will seize the first opportunity to move this critical legislation forward and ensure that people aged 65 and older have access to safe and effective non-opioid options for pain management.

Thank you for your leadership and continued commitment to protecting the health and wellbeing of America's older adults. Together, we can prevent opioid addiction before it starts and, in the process, save lives.
