649 Deaths

or **79% of all overdose deaths** in the year ending February 2026 involved opioids.¹

Rx

Over 553,000

or 2.7% of all Medicare Part D claims were for opioids in 2024 - an average of **27.5 per prescriber**.²



29.7 Opioid Prescriptions

were written for every 100 persons in Connecticut in 2024.³



\$67.9 Billion

the estimated total societal cost of opioid use disorder (OUD) to the state in 2024.⁴

of surgical patients receive an opioid prescription following surgery annually.⁵



3 out of 4

illicit users initiated their habit with prescription opioids.⁶

Medicare beneficiaries suffered from OUD in 2023. **53,165 experienced an opioid overdose**.⁷

the estimated cost of the opioid crisis⁸, with Medicare shouldering \$33 billion.⁹

Over 42,000 Americans

died from an opioid-related overdose between February 2025 and February 2026¹⁰

63% of all drug overdose deaths.

That translates to approximately
117 lives lost every day
in the United States due to an opioid-related drug overdose.¹⁰
